Lt. Governor Sheila Oliver Visits METC



This past March, METC was thrilled to welcome New Jersey's Lt. Governor, Sheila Y. Oliver who joined us to acknowledge our work with the NJ Historic Trust and present us with a \$50,000 check from the Trust. This Historic Site Management

(HSM) Grant was awarded to METC to fund the feasibility study for the creation of a viewable storage collections facility in the museum. The Lt. Governor noted that "... METC is a valuable educational, recreational and historical asset to the Madison community and State of New Jersey, and we're pleased to provide this grant to help preserve their priceless collections. And this new state-of-the-art visible collections facility will not only help preserve artifacts, but will add a new dimension to the museum that visitors can view and enjoy."

In addition to the Lt. Governor, several other state and local officials were on hand to recognize METC's work with historic preservation and historic site management. They included Madison Mayor Bob Conley, Madison Council members Astri Baillie and Maureen Byrne, NJ Historic Trust Board Members Janet Foster and Peter Lindsay, NJ Historic Trust Executive Director Dorothy Guzzo and METC Board Chair Martin Barbato, among others.

Earlier this year, Governor Murphy signed a \$11.7 million appropriations bill approving 50 Preserve New Jersey Historic Preservation Fund Grant recommendations that were made by the New Jersey Historic Trust in the fall. The 2021 fund is supporting preservation planning, heritage tourism and capital projects to save and promote historic sites throughout the state. There are multiple categories and levels of grants awarded by the fund.

We are most grateful for this support from the Lieutenant Governor and the NJ Historic Trust, which enables us to continue the preservation of our historic building and the creation of a new viewable storage facility that will protect and conserve our collection.

Uncovered: Hidden Treasures from METC's Permanent Collection

Coming Soon! *Uncovered: Hidden Treasures from METC's*Permanent Collection



In 1969, Edgar and Agnes Land founded METC. When the museum opened its doors in 1970, the centerpiece of its exhibits were the historic artifacts collected by its founders. Since then, METC has added to its collection through donations or purchases.

Comprised of approximately 8,900 objects, historic records, and library holdings, METC's collection represents a comprehensive and dedicated approach to New Jersey's development from an early settlement to industrialization. METC has featured the permanent collection in informative gallery exhibits and educational programs focusing on home, shop, and farm trades in the 18th and 19th centuries. However, with

only 15% of the collection on view much of METC's collection has been tucked away in storage.

On July 6, METC will open a new Main Gallery exhibit titled *Uncovered: Hidden Treasures from METC's Permanent Collection*. For the first time in decades, objects housed deep in METC's storage facilities will be on display to the public. This exhibit will reveal the depth and breadth of METC's permanent collection with objects uncovered during METC's collections move and comprehensive inventory.

Collection Inventory



Although 2020 was quite the tumultuous year, METC's Curatorial Department was busy with several projects. In early 2020, METC embarked on an exciting new initiative, packing the entire collection housed within the museum's onsite storage room for relocation to offsite facilities. This project is part of a larger multiyear initiative to construct a new climate-controlled viewable storage facility in the museum. However, before relocating the collection back onsite, METC will conduct a comprehensive collection inventory. From this, METC will have a better assessment of the holdings within the permanent collection and identify areas within the collection where we need to halt collecting or continue growing.

While packing the collection and inventorying objects in METC's offsite facilities, Curator of Collections Shelley Cathcart located several objects that were unique and noticed many had never been on view. A large toolchest was relocated to METC's offsite storage, and upon inventorying

the toolchest, Shelley noticed many of the tools, specifically planes, were stamped with the name "A. Hinkley." This piqued her curatorial interests and sparked a quick search in METC's donor files and other digitized historic archival records to locate more information on this individual.

METC Brings Craft Festivals to Schools

During a typical spring, the METC Education staff would visit schools to run all-day Craft Festivals, where all the students would rotate between 5 or 6 stations. While the METC Education staff could not present these Craft Festivals at the schools this year, both Hamilton School in the Bridgewater-Raritan School District and Ridgewood Ave. School in the Glen Ridge School District opted to still run these fun events for their 3rd graders. The METC Education Staff packed up supply kits for each child. All the students, whether in school or at home, were able to do four crafts either with the assistance of pre-recorded video from METC or with live instruction from an METC educator. We were thrilled to be able to provide such a hands-on experience for all of these students, and ensure this fun event went forward, despite the limitations imposed by the pandemic.

Summer camp is back! The METC Education Staff will be offering 6 one- or two-day camps this summer. Last year, despite the pandemic, we ran several safe, fun, in-person camps and are looking forward to expanding on that success this year. These camps will take place in our spacious Education Annex, while also utilizing METC's exhibits and other aspects of the museum building. Consultants

Viewable Storage Facility Updates




This Spring, METC completed a feasibility study for the design of a new state of the art viewable storage facility in the historic James Library Building. This study was generously funded by the NJ Historic Trust, NJ Historical Commission and the Madison Open Space, Recreation and Historic Preservation Trust. METC maintains a longtime partnership with consultant Historic Building Architects LLC who have managed restoration projects with the museum since an initial Preservation Plan was completed in 2012. Historic Building Architects conducted comprehensive analysis for the new space-- detailing the needed facility upgrades, storage for collections, and creative solutions to adapt the existing spaces for greater accessibility in public programming and research. The viewable storage facility was a part of METC's strategic planning for many years but a mold infestation in the existing storage spaces led the museum to move the project along to protect both the museum's historic artifact collection and building. The study has produced an investigative report and construction documents for the museum as we enter into the next phase and make the new facility a reality.
